You are welcome to attend any of these activities run by these organisations in the venue listed.

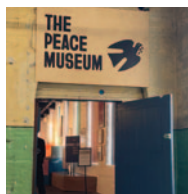
## Sunday 21st June 2026

**St Peter's Cathedral, St Peter's Square East, Belfast, BT12 4BU** 3:00pm - 4:00pm

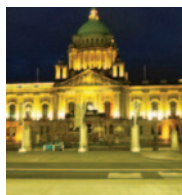

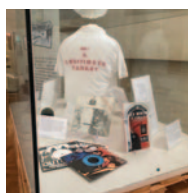
**PRONI, 2 Titanic Boulevard, Belfast, BT3 9HQ** Mon-Fri 9:00am - 4:45pm
